## FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

It is mid-June (as I write this) – school is out, and we are making the transition to our summer schedule and the pace of activity is winding down, right? Wrong! I am in the midst of a particularly busy week, which includes a meeting (or two) every evening. Monday it was the Council on Ministries, Tuesday, Fund Raising Task Force and Missions Committee, Wednesday: Vacation Bible School, and Thursday, Dixboro Fair Planning Committee. Let's focus on each of these areas in turn, working our way backwards through the week.

### DIXBORO FAIR, AUGUST 6

Mike Huey has been doing an excellent job of coordinating the large number of volunteers needed to pull off this annual event. All the committee heads are working hard to ensure another successful year. Yes, the Fair is "labor intensive". But I've worked at enough of them now to know they are also a lot of fun. The sense of camaraderie and feeling of mutual support from the Dixboro Church family makes it all worthwhile. This is one of those times when we really do function as a large, extended family and that is an experience not to be missed.

### AN HISTORICAL NOTE ON THE FAIR

We are calling this "The 28<sup>th</sup> Annual Dixboro Country Fair", but is it really? Thanks to Dale Leslie, who recently dropped off a wealth of archival material on Dixboro Church, I've been able to do some research into the origins of the Fair. It seems to have begun as a celebration of the American Bicentennial on the Village Green, July 4, 1976. The following year, Pastor Hal Ferris and parishioner C. Richard (Dick) Bird (the first fair chairman) decided to make the chicken barbeque, ice cream social and carnival games an annual event.

Arts and crafts were added in 1978. So if 1977 was year one, that would make 2005 the 29<sup>th</sup> annual event. And if we begin counting in 1976, this would be our 30<sup>th</sup> fair. But then, some people with long memories claim that we missed a year somewhere along the way.

So whether this is the 28<sup>th</sup>, 29<sup>th</sup>, or 30<sup>th</sup> Dixboro Fair, come work, come eat, come buy; in short, come to the Fair!

## VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL

By the time you read this, the “Serengeti Trek” will likely have ended (it’s scheduled for June 27 thru July 1) but I want to take this opportunity to affirm the leadership of Stephanie Cloutier.

Like her predecessors Sandy Bowers and Peggy Severin, Stephanie came to the position of Education Director with no previous experience of paid church work, but a lot of energy, enthusiasm and expertise. During these last few weeks I have had the privilege of watching Stephanie pull together a volunteer V.B.S. staff and engage in a creative give and take with the result that people are committed to and excited about this year’s program. It was Stephanie’s idea to add the pre-school component and to move V.B.S. to evenings – a bold stroke.

Knowing how some of my clergy colleagues struggle to find even adequate leadership for their churches’ educational program, I can hardly believe our good fortune. To borrow a baseball metaphor, we’re “three for three” on Education Directors at Dixboro – not a single strike out.

## MISSIONS:

I missed most of the meeting because the Fund Raising Task Force (see below) were meeting simultaneously. But I am excited to report that we are reviving the idea of becoming a “Spotlight Church”. This is a special recognition that the Detroit Annual Conference gives to congregations involved in a wide range of missions activity. Participation in seven areas of mission is the requirement. But lest that sounds too daunting, the good news is that we have most of them covered. There is really only one area that might pose a bit of a “stretch” for us, “Missionary Salary Support” – entering into a “covenant relationship” with a missionary of our choice. It usually takes the form of pledging \$3 per member of the congregation. I’m not aware that we have ever done that here – but I’m also convinced that it’s not beyond our grasp.

## FUND RAISING:

There have been three meetings of this task force since the Administrative Board decided to go forward with the Sanctuary Renovation Project. Each one leaves me all the more convinced that our attempt to underwrite the largest capital campaign in the history of Dixboro Church is going to be a success.

The task force is made up of idea men and women, and the ideas keep coming and the enthusiasm is growing. I hope and pray that it will be contagious.

Some “big ticket” items have been discussed – like the possibility of receiving payment for enrolling the Village Green in the Ann Arbor “Greenbelt Program”. Or the “Path of Faith”, a brick-lined walk with individual bricks recognizing donors or memorializing loved ones. Other ideas might be dismissed as “small potatoes”, but here’s the point: nobody is dismissing anything. We realize the value of everyone’s ideas and the importance of both large and small gifts.

In order for us to raise \$508,000 no gift is unimportant and no giver is unimportant. Everything and, most especially, every one matters. A scripture passage comes to mind from the often-overlooked Book of Tobit: “If you have many possessions, make your gift from them in proportion: if few, do not be afraid to give according to the little you have.” (4:8) To this I can only add a hearty amen!

One of the ideas that came up in Tuesday’s meeting was changing the name for Fund Raising Task Force to Dixboro Church Renovation Project Committee. I can just hear the anguished cry of the congregation, “How can you cease to be the Fund Raising Task Force even before you’ve raised any funds?” Sigh... Maybe you just had to have been there.

Stay tuned. We’re working hard and you’ll be hearing from us soon.

## COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

This program-planning group is looking ahead to the Fall and into 2006.

We've decided to change the Sunday morning worship schedule (again).

**9:00 am Contemporary worship service**

**10:00 am Sunday School**

**11:00 am Traditional worship service**

We keep trying to find the One Single Perfect Schedule of Services and I'm beginning to fear that there is no such thing. There are pros and cons and possibilities that work better for some and not as well for others. What isn't working about our present schedule is that it essentially segregates children from parents and makes worship an "adult only" activity. It also has effectively eliminated adult education from Sunday mornings. The new Fall schedule allows for Intergenerational worship (kids will leave for an age-appropriate experience during the sermon) and provides more time between services for adult classes and interaction. Is it perfect? No, but we believe it will be an improvement.

## Fall Family Retreat

Registration forms are now available in this newsletter and in Fellowship Hall for the Fall Family retreat to be held at the FaHoLo Camp & Conference Center in Grass Lake. The retreat will begin on the evening of October 28<sup>th</sup> through the afternoon of the 29<sup>th</sup>. The focus will be "Worshipping as a Family."

Our dynamic speaker is an excellent resource on family worship. In addition, there will be lots of activities for family members of all ages, including rock-wall climbing, swimming, crafts, and an evening bonfire and game night.

Cost: Adults: \$115.00 (per couple), family members age 6-17: \$37.00, family mem-

We're adding a service on Christmas Eve and taking one away on Christmas and New Year's Day.

New for Christmas Eve will be a family-oriented 5:00 pm service. The focus will be on telling the Christmas story to young children. A lot of singing and not so much preaching. And not over an hour in length. The familiar 7:00 and 11:00 services will be unchanged.

Then, since both December 25, 2005 and January 1, 2006 fall on Sundays, we will offer ONE SERVICE ONLY on both days: 11:00 a.m. Christmas Day will be a traditional service with a lot of carol singing. New Year's Day will be a contemporary celebration.

And if you're reading this and thinking, "I don't want to even consider something that is six months away", perhaps the talk of Christmas might cool off whatever July heat wave you might be experiencing at this moment.

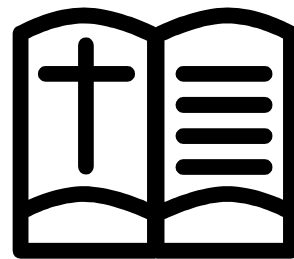



## FAMILY YARD SALE-Aug 27

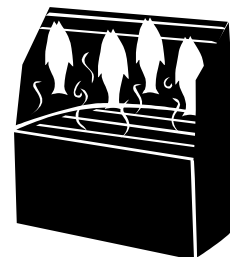

## ALI SPEARS

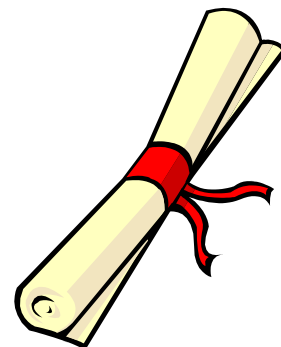

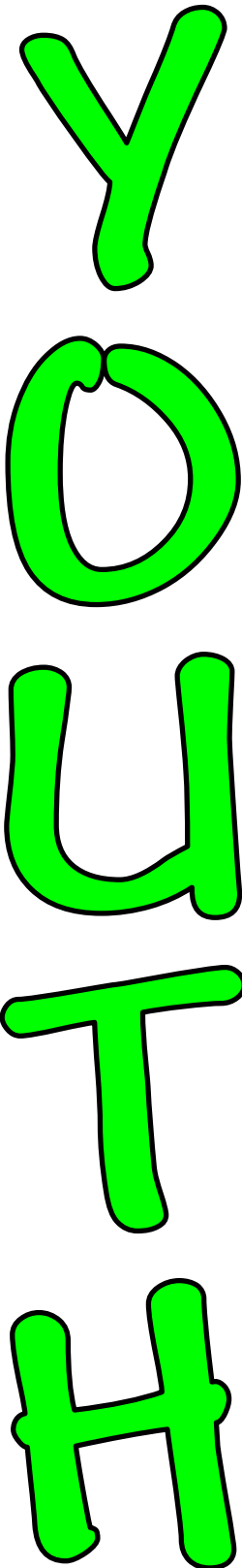
