Dear Dixboro Family,





Dixboro Devotional (March/April 2017)

Where the Church Meets to Pray

"Help My Unbelief"
by Harold Tuckett

Read Mark 9:14-29

20 And they brought the boy to him. And when the spirit saw him, immediately it convulsed the boy, and he fell on the ground and rolled about, foaming at the mouth. 21 And Jesus asked his father, "How long has this been happening to him?" And he said, "From childhood. 22 And it has often cast him into fire and into water, to destroy him. But if you can do anything, have compassion on us and help us." 23 And Jesus said to him, "'If you can!' All things are possible for one who believes." 24 Immediately the father of the child cried out and said, "I believe; help my unbelief!" --Mark 9:20-24 (ESV)

Mark's story tells of a father whose faith has suffered many doubts, due to his son's torments and the seeming lack of any help for them. The father's anguished cry to "help my unbelief" resonates profoundly for me, since my own faith journey had a period when doubt and disbelief was ascendant; for many years, I was an atheist.

And yet if doubts can test or threaten our faith, I submit that they can also strengthen it; I've experienced that too. The theologian Paul Tillich said "Doubt is not the opposite of faith; it is an element of faith" and I believe that's true. I believe that honest doubt, faced and wrestled with, will both strengthen faith and help us to minister to those who also struggle with doubt. For example:

- Socrates said that the "unexamined life is not worth living", meaning, I think, that our beliefs can only be wholly ours when we make them our own through reflection and challenges. Timothy Keller demonstrates this by use of this analogy in his book "The Reason for God":

"A faith without some doubts is like a human body without any antibodies in it. People who blithely go through life too busy or indifferent to ask hard questions about why they believe as they do will find themselves defenseless against either the experience of tragedy or the probing questions of a smart skeptic. A person's faith can collapse almost overnight if she has failed over the years to listen to her own doubts, which should only be discarded after long reflection. Believers should acknowledge and wrestle with doubts—not only their own but their friends' and neighbors'."

- The noted New Testament scholar William Barclay affirms that doubts can strengthen our own faith, but he also goes farther:

"A faith is not the highest kind of faith until it has been tested. We should never be ashamed of having doubts. They are the way to real certainty. *Only the man who has had them and faced them can help others.*"

There are many examples of this last point; C.S. Lewis, for example, while perhaps the most famous Christian author of the 20th century, was an atheist for 15 years before his conversion, and that experience gave him real understanding and compassion for those who find faith difficult. And in my own experience, I've found that being an ex-atheist gives me credibility in witnessing to non-believers, since they can see that I was once where they are—I "know where they're coming from". Experiences of doubting can be powerfully transformed into opportunities for spreading the good news of Jesus Christ.

In the scripture from Mark, it's worth noting that while Jesus does give the father a mild rebuke ("If you can?"), his doubts do not condemn him; in fact, by mustering up enough faith to ask for Jesus' help, his son is healed. Facing our doubts and wrestling with them can in fact produce results that will strengthen our faith and further God's Kingdom.

Prayer: God, let us never be ashamed of our doubts. May they strengthen our faith and lead us to further your work in the world. Amen.

Visions from Your Visioning Team

A couple church members have inquired as to how the Visioning Team is working since its inception three years ago. So, as facilitator of the team, I realized it was time for an update of our work, our accomplishments, and where we are headed.

The proposal for a DUMC Visioning Team was discussed at the May, 2014 Church Council meeting. Initial working documents were prepared by a task force and presented to the Church Council August, 2014. The Church Council approved piloting this alternative organizational structure which has been used successfully in other churches our size as a substitute for the Administrative Council.

There are 12 members on the Visioning Team, each member being either a committee leader from one of the five administrative ministries or a team leader from one of the three program ministries, plus both clergy and a secretary. The current membership includes:

Chair of Staff-Parish- Brian Charnetski
Chair of Church Council- Tom Little
Lay Leader- Kenn Scheffer
Secretary- Cody Sulkowski

The charge to the Visioning Team is:

1. Coordinate visioning and goal setting across all church committees and teams.
2. Address strategic planning for both operational/administrative issues and program issues.
3. Facilitate communication and coordination across all church committees and teams.
4. Make recommendations for policy and procedures to DUMC Church Council for decisions.

The team was formed in the fall of 2014 and we had our first meeting December 15, 2014. Our goal was to meet at least 3-4 times a year as a whole group. During those meetings we have engaged in dialogue to achieve our 4 charges listed above. Briefly, some of our activities have included:

- Sharing written and/or brief oral reports to enhance communication and coordination of resources between and among work areas. For example, when the DUMW had left over cookies from the Cookie Walk in December, the Nurture Team packaged up and delivered over 30 plates to folks who hadn't been at church for a while.
- Reading, "Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations". For each chapter we discussed how DUMC was doing and what we might do better. This focus was paired with Rev. Tonya's sermons for engaging the whole congregation.

- Sharing concerns of team members and making recommendations. For example, when the tradition of “Blue Jean Sunday” had fewer and fewer participants each year, resulting in uncompleted work, the Visioning Team recommended discontinuing that activity and exploring alternative options to accomplish the “spring cleaning” tasks.
- Discussing how to best manage the Dixboro Community Fair in 2015 and 2016, and collaborations with the Dixboro Farmers’ Market for both church visibility and “Cool Kids at the Market”.
- Preparing Ministry Moments for Sunday Morning Services. This highlighted each of the Program and Administrative Ministries individually over 10 Sundays, September-November, 2015.
- Scheduling our first Visioning Team meeting January 3, 2017, to develop a comprehensive 2017 calendar for all events, committee meetings, etc. that DUMC is involved in or sponsoring. Our goal was to avoid overlapping events and meetings as well as reduce the actual number of committee meetings.

This new organizational pilot project seems to be working and current plans, with the approval of the Church Council, are for it to continue to evaluate its effectiveness. However, to help keep all of us in touch with the great work of our/your DUMC ministries, we are considering follow-up articles for future CHIMES editions. These articles could begin by highlighting activities of the Program or Administrative Ministries and/or how the Visioning Team is joining in the efforts of the Vital Church Initiative to keep us all moving in the same direction.

Another recent suggestion focusing on our charge of facilitating communication and coordination, was to offer “Visioning Team Town Hall Meetings” two or three times a year.

These Town Hall meetings could achieve two purposes:

- 1) to communicate what the Visioning Team is recommending
- 2) and probably more importantly, to have open discussions with all members of the congregation, especially those who are not members of the Program or Administrative Ministry groups. What do you think about these ideas?

When you have questions, concerns, suggestions, or Kudos, regarding the workings of the Visioning Team please feel free to contact me or any of the Visioning Team members. We strongly encourage open dialogues to keep DUMC a welcoming, healthy, and vital congregation for all.

Scripture: 2 Timothy 2:19 ...God's firm foundation stands, bearing this seal: "The Lord knows those who are his." (Numbers 16:5)

Prayer: This is the time of worship, Holy Spirit, when you come to shed your light into the hearts of your faithful. We welcome your light into our lives; may our music this morning reflect your light & love to all who are here with us. Amen

Scripture: Psalm 98:8-9a Let the floods clap their hands; let the hills sing for joy together before the Lord, for he comes to judge the earth.


Prayer: Holy God, your entire creation sings your praises and rejoices in your majesty. In our small corner of the world, we sing to celebrate your steadfast love and mercy and to bring glory to your holy name. Amen

Scripture: Psalm 51:17 The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit, a broken spirit and a contrite heart

Prayer: Almighty God, help us to keep your vision of Lent in sight: that we humble our hearts and draw closer to you. Guide us to awareness that our actions- sacrifice of additional time spent in prayer, fasting, and helping our neighbors in need- have value in your eyes when our hearts are being transformed, when we're becoming the people you envision us to be. Thank you for our musical talents, used in your service. Amen



Hot Cross Buns

You may know it as a nursery rhyme or a children's song, but the hot cross buns I am referring to are yeasted sweet buns, flavored with fruits and spices and marked with a cross on top. Hot cross buns are traditionally eaten during the Lenten season. The cross on the top of the bun represents the crucifixion of Jesus, while the spices inside signify the spices used to embalm him at his burial.

English folklore includes many superstitions surrounding hot cross buns, including:

- Hot cross buns baked on Good Friday will remain fresh and mold-free when hung in the kitchen
- The cross on top will protect from evil spirits
- If taken on a sea voyage, hot cross buns will protect against shipwreck
- Those who share a hot cross bun on Good Friday will share a strong friendship throughout the year



Lenten Brunch Coming March 19!



History Corner

Along Plymouth Road, at each end of Dixboro, there are colorful new signs! The village, which soon became a bustling village, was established in 1824 and platted in 1826 by John Dix. In December 1857 area residents agreed to build a church, which was completed one year later. The Dixboro United Methodist Church celebrated 150 years in 2008.

In 1979 Carol Willits Freeman published a book, *Of Dixboro: Lest We Forget*. She included history of the area, many memories, and pictures of early homes in the area. The Dixboro General Store, across Plymouth Road from the church, still sell copies of the book that is delightful and informative.

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
